ADBSS/AGFD/BLM COOPERATIVE WATER PROJECT

Red Cliff Catchment (AGFD #966) and Lambing Springs (AGFD #573)

March 17-19, 2017

Location:

GMU 44AW, Gibraltar Mtns GPS Coord. of Red Cliffs site: N 34° 12.909', W 114° 07.236'
GPS Coord. of Lambing Springs site: N 34° 14.783', W 114° 08.156'
GPS Coord. of staging area: N 34° 15.169', W 114° 07.969'

Project Description:

To camping area: From Phoenix take Interstate 10 West to Quartzite, then take AZ hwy 95 N to Parker, From Parker (Air Port Rd) proceed north approximately 10 miles on Hwy 95 to Buckskin Mountain State Park. Entrance is on the Left.

To Staging area: From the Buckskin Mountain State Park go 1.59 miles East on AZ 95 towards Lake Havasu City. Turn Right onto a dirt road and go 0.14 miles to dirt lot Staging area for both projects

Primary objective is the Red Cliff site which is remedial effort from 2001 project and will consist of adding a new collection dam and 300' of new 4" diameter feedline. It is important for all volunteers to be at the staging area promptly at 7:30 am each day for transport to the Red Cliff site and to be prepared to stay all day. Secondary objective is the Lambing Springs site where we will be building a 30' long gabion across a wash for water diversion.

Difficulty of Hike:

Hike to both sites will be minimal.

Special Advisories:

- 1) Work will not start until Friday morning so earlier arrivals are not necessary for these projects. The bulk of the work will occur on Saturday and will require some degree of commuting..
- 2) This project is being accomplished in cooperation with the Arizona Game and Fish Department and BLM and funded by the HPC Special Bighorn Sheep Tag Program and AGFD
- 3) Please closely follow the map, flagging and signs to the campsite and do not wonder onto any other roads. The road to the campsite is excellent and no issues for trailers and RV's. 4x4 is not required but is always recommended.
- 4) Please bring your own firewood, charcoal, or propane stoves for cooking/heating. Do not use or destroy native vegetation.
- 5) We must all clean up after ourselves and haul our own trash out. While on site please dispose of water bottles, cans and other trash in garbage bags.
- 6) As you will staying out all day on the respective work site please bring plenty of water, lunch, sunscreen and appropriate protective clothing and footwear for the conditions and work.
- 7) Please bring your own work gloves, safety glasses, tape measure and marking pen to the project if you have them. A limited number will be available on site but we often run out or don't have enough.
- 8) All campsites must be within the designated camping area. There should be sufficient space for all vehicles. To minimize impact please keep spacing tight and more of a group camp. Ports-Johns may or may not be provided.
- 9) Please minimize disturbance to soils and existing vegetation. Respect the natural beauty of the area and haul away all trash (Do not burn trash.) Fire rings and vehicle tracks should be completely raked out when leaving the campsite.

General Advisories:

This is a very remote desert area and the possibilities of danger and life threatening injuries exist. Volunteers should have a reliable vehicle, be in good physical condition and be familiar with desert terrain. Bring plenty of water. Volunteers should wear protective clothing, appropriate footwear and bring a lunch, jacket, rain parka, sunscreen and water (enough for one day) to the project site. Please follow your map and do not drive off existing roadways. Campsites should not be located more than 50 feet from the apparent two track roads in and around the camp area. Vehicle tracks leading to camps should be raked out upon your departure. Project sites are often unsafe for young children due to the steep terrain and the use of construction equipment. Parents or guardians must maintain direct control and supervision of any minors on the project site at all times. Pets are discouraged. Projects will take place regardless of local weather conditions. All ADBSS projects feature a catered Saturday evening meal and Sunday breakfast. Membership in the ADBSS will put you on the mailing list to receive project flyers and maps.

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
