The banquet will be highlighted by award presentations to hunters whose ram qualifies (162 B&C points) for listing in the Arizona Wildlife Trophies book published by AWF. Also, a trophy will be presented to the lucky hunter who harvested the best trophy Desert Bighorn Ram of the season.

Following these activities will be dancing till midnight with music provided by a juke box. Also, wet bar will be available after dinner. Plan to attend this informative event and see what's happening in your Society! (Ordering info enclosed).

#### PHASE II ZOO PROJECT

For the past four weekends the Society has launched a massive effort to complete the Zoo Project. The turnout has been fantastic but still more hands are needed to finish this task. The dedication of the building is scheduled for 10 March 1974.

At present, the building is almost completed with the steps going in on the weekend of 26 and 27 of January. The fence posts were set during 19 and 20 January and the fence was strung on 26 and 27. As soon as the steps are finished interior work will begin. This task consists of plastering, installing light fixtures, display cases and building a diorama. This diorama will feature a full mount of a ram placed in a natural setting. The Society has been fortunate to meet Johnny Ozols — a talented artist of the old school — who has donated his services to decorate the diorama.

The display cases in the building will house artifacts relating to the Desert Bighorn Sheep history in Arizona and your Society is looking for donations of these items.

#### AWF CONVENTION REPORT

The fifty-first annual convention of the Arizona Wildlife Federation was held in Scottsdale on January 11-13, 1974. Some 71 voting delegates gathered to act on 42 resolutions submitted by 43 sportsman's clubs from throughout the State of Arizona. The Arizona Desert Bighorn Sheep Society, an Associate-affiliate Club, was allowed one voting delegate to this convention. Needless to say one vote would hardly count, but let me assure you the one vote left its mark on the convention.

First, Society submitted a resolution (No. 37) relative to illegal taking of Arizona Desert Bighorn Sheep that called for a maximum fine of \$2000. This resolution was reworked in Committee and combined with another resolution that applied to illegal taking of all big game. The delegates voted DO—PASS that the Arizona Wildlife Federation sponsor legislation amending the appropriate Arizona statute on the illegal taking of all big game to make a violation of that statute a high misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1000 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not to exceed one year, or both.

Next, the delegates considered Resolution No. 32 urging the United States Department of Interior to terminate domestic livestock grazing on the Kofa Game Range within a 5 year phasing-out period. The delegate from the Society spoke out against this resolution pointing out some of the good things the ranchers have done for this area while at the same time brought up that the burros and coyotes cause of the real problem within the Kofa's and that something should be done about them. After all discussions were over the delegates voted DO—NOT PASS.

Another important resolution, No. 34, urged the Secretary of the Interior and; or the President of the United States to place the Kofa Game Range under the sole jurisdiction and management of the U. S. Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife. This resolution was passed by the general delegates late Saturday afternoon. That night, during the banquet and afterwards, some delegates got together to review this resolution. It was decided that this was a bad move at present. Sunday, after most of the resolutions were over, the delegate from the Society made a motion to reconsider Resolution No. 34 and bring it before the members again. After being called out of order and advised that it couldn't be done since the resolution passed Saturday, a vote was taken and this resolution was defeated.

I feel certain that some members of the Society wonder why we belong to the Arizona Wildlife Federation, but if they could have been in the audience to see how all these sportsmen worked together, how important the resolutions were and how seriously each delegate treated them, they could feel proud of having a voice, even if it is just one vote. Thanks.

Our objective was to clean out the cistern and its spillway and then build a riprap dam above the cistern to retard fill from washing back down off the mountain.

which turned out to be a rocket fin (we were on the Air Force target range), following which most returned to the task at hand. Notably absent was Jerry Petkovsek who had remained behind to prepare the evening's meal, and while his presence was missed, several members did observe how the afternoon's solitude was

highly conducive to progress. By evening the cistern was largely cleaned out and the basic foundation for the riprap dam was laid.

Camp cooks Houzenga and Petkovsek greeted the other workers with a buffalo stew, meat courtesy of Tom Saad, all cooked in a deep pit with dutch ovens. Monte Dodson suggested the addition of a little chili to the second batch of corn bread, a suggestion that was well intentioned but appreciated by too few. Around the campfire we discussed many subjects, one of which was the future of these waterhole projects in view of the energy shortage, and it seemed to be the concensus that the program should continue as planned so long as there is a reasonable prospect of getting gas. Also, the plea was made for members to propose waterhole projects rather than relying upon the AG&F or USBSFW for prospects.

The project was completed within a few hours on Sunday morning, and we were on our way by noon. A brief stop in Tacna where our fine friends Paul Scheuneman and Dick Morrow had arranged to see that vehicles requiring service received it. A special tip of the hat to these gentlemen, for without such courtesy these projects might well be doomed.

#### SPEAKERS BUREAU

The Society operates a speakers bureau service intended to communicate information about the interesting activities of the Society to other groups. Ed Shannahan, Doug Reynolds and Bob Carson have done a number of presentations in the past couple of years and stand ready and willing to do their thing for your group at your beck and call.

The usual presentation runs about 45 minutes with a 5 minute preamble, 25 minute narrated slide show and a 15 minute question and answer or discussion period. The presentation can be slanted toward the conservation activities of the Society, the natural history and ecology of Desert Bighorn Sheep or toward Desert Bighorn Sheep hunting, depending on the interests of the group that is to be the audience. The presentation can be made longer or shorter to suit the time that you have available.

The speakers are equipped with a fine carousel projector and screen that belongs to the Society so all they need is 115 VAC, your hall and your audience. The speakers usually bring an interesting display of Desert Bighorn Sheep artifacts, pickup heads, horns, hoofs, droppings, etc. and hand out literature about the Society.

Addition of Article XVI - Creation of a Board of Governors




This gold and blue ADBSS patch is a must for every member. Ideal for jackets, backpacks or your collection of patches.
