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

Mexico Sheep Hunt '79



Al Pellizarri's 186 + B&C Ram

The following report on some outstanding rams taken in Mexico has been abstracted from the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep newsletter of Winter 1979.

Al Pellizzari, Palo Alto, California, took a magnum ram at 186 + B&C points in the Pico del Diablo area. Clint Heber, Red Bluff, California, took a ram at 185 + points. Jack Atcheson, Jr. of Butte, Montana, reportedly took one at 185. Bob Zachrich of Holgate, Ohio, brought one in at 184.

I have learned unofficially that Mexican sheep permits for 1979, would approach \$8000 per each. In spite of the fees, Mexico obviously has a sizeable population of mature magnum class rams.

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Desert Sheep Hunting: Nevada vs Arizona

Some of us can recall ten years ago when Arizona issued 80 to 90 bighorn sheep permits each year. For 1979 it is estimated that a few more than 50 permits will be issued. That is a loss of 37% to 44%. There are many reasons for this substantial decline. The most significant is the increase of hunter success from around 30% to present levels which run over 80%. However, there are also several factors that cannot be so easily documented and are speculative at best. I think management experts agree, though, that Arizona's sheep populations overall are equal to or greater than 10 years ago.

It is interesting to note that for 1979, Nevada will issue 81 permits for sheep. That is 60% more than Arizona. Nevada's sheep populations are reported to be no greater than Arizona's. They have only 16 hunt units as compared to our nineteen. No unit has less than two permits and the highest number of permits is 10. They also issue 9 non-resident permits compared to Arizona's 5.

Nevada's legal ram requirements are much higher than Arizona's.

Arizona 3/4 curl or 28 inch horn length.

Nevada At least 7 years old or Boone & Crockett score of

144 points (best horn score doubled).

Nevada requires all hunters to attend a hunters clinic — Arizona does not.

Nevada allows for the taking of more than one ram a life-time. If you take a sheep you cannot apply again for 10 years. Arizona has a "one a lifetime" rule.

You draw your own conclusions. Anyone have any comments?

Sheep Clinic Set For October 6, '79


The Sheep Society's Annual Sheep Hunters Clinic is scheduled for early October. The September issue of the Ram's Horn will give all the particulars.

Publication of Charles Sheldon's Southwestern Field Journals



Charles Sheldon - Famous Naturalist

Charles Sheldon is recognized as one of the foremost naturalists of the early nineteen hundreds. His three prior publications, The Wilderness of The Upper Yukon (1911), The Wilderness of The North Pacific Coast Islands (1912), The Wilderness of The Denali (1930), are considered by many collectors to be the foundation of any comprehensive library of hunting books. He is also thought of as the "father" of desert sheep hunting, based on his extensive collection of desert bighorns in his gathering of biological data on desert sheep.

The Sheep Society will publish Sheldon's field journal under the title of *The Wilderness of Desert Bighorns And Seri Indians*. Being the fourth and probably the last published works of Charles Sheldon, the book will be a valuable collectors item and a must for any hunters library.

The Sheep Society will underwrite the project to preserve this priceless work on "desert sheep and Seri Indians" and to raise monies for future conservation projects concerning desert bighorns.

We plan an extensive pre-order campaign in the next few weeks and Society members will be receiving a special mailing outlining all the specifics about that publication. Watch for it!

GRIPES & BITCHES:

Offered As Constructive Criticism Hot Seat — Arizona Game & Fish Department

The Game & Fish Department has adopted a policy during the last few years of establishing hunts units for desert sheep in late April. Permit numbers for sheep hunting will not be set until June 29 & 30. The deadline for making application for all 1979 hunts is July 2nd. In other words, sportsmen have two days, one of which is Sunday, to find out how many sheep permits have been set for each unit before the application deadline. The department explains that this time table is necessary to properly assess survey information and to comply with deadlines for inputting of data into the computer.

The Sheep Society would encourage the Department and Commission to strive for a process that would set all hunt units and permit numbers not later than the May meeting. Preferably units and permit numbers would be established at the same meeting.

'A Tangible Contribution to Our Wildlife'

Waterhole Development Projects, '79


