## **Tom Boggess Draws Rocky Mountain Permit**

In the spring when everyone was thinking of planting a garden, I went to the mail box and got a letter from Wyoming Game and Fish. You guessed it, a BIGHORN SHEEP PERMIT! Too bad, Lindley, we will have to take that family vacation some other time.

Dean Priest and I went to Wyoming in mid-August to scout for sheep and bow hunt outside the wilderness area. It is Wyoming law that you must hire a guide to hunt sheep in the wilderness areas. You guessed it again, all the sheep live in the wilderness. We left the bow at the edge of the wilderness and then saw 100 ewes and lambs and 20 rams in four days of scouting.

I proceeded to hire a guide and, after picking up Tom Saad at the airport, went back to the K-Z Ranch. Dan Estes was the outfitter who led us into the North Absaroka Wilderness 15-30 miles (depending on whether you ask me or the guide) to our base camp.

August 29th we had 6" fresh snow which put a stop to looking for that rump patch. It was think black, brown,

grey or whatever for awhile. Tom Saad located four rams frolicking in a snow field with a ewe and lamb. This is quite unusual in Wyoming as the ewes and rams aren't generally together that time of year. We passed them up the first day and went back to that area after a few days of unsuccessful hunting. We located the rams moving to heavy timber and expected to find them in the woods. There were many sheep beds on the benches in dense timber. We were fortunate and spotted them at the edge of the timber and slipped through the trees for an easy shot.

On our way back to the K-Z we rode four miles down a trail with a Grizzly track in the middle. It would have been interesting to have met him with the 15 horse pack train with a white mule strapped to my Bighorn Sheep head. That mule is lucky to be alive; he really looked a lot like those desert buffalo.

I am looking forward to reading someone's Desert Sheep story in the next RAM'S HORN.

## Foundation Convention To Be Held In Phoenix

The Foundation for North American Wild Sheep will hold its Fourth Annual Convention in Phoenix on February 25, 26 and 27, 1981 at the Hyatt Regency, 122 North 2nd Street. Registration begins 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, February 25th and exhibits open at 3:00 P.M. on Wednesday. Also on Wednesday from 6:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M. there is a Mexican theme reception and cocktail party in the hotel atrium. After that the hospitality room doors swing open and the fun begins!

Breakfast is served buffet style from 8:00-9:00 A.M. each morning and the convention program begins at 9:00 A.M. Registration is \$125.00 single and \$225.00 per couple if you pay in advance. At the door, registration is \$140.00 single and \$240.00 per couple. Should you have to cancel a pre-paid registration, we'll refund all but \$10 per person until Friday, February 20th.

Registration price entitles you to attend all convention programs, movies, exhibits, displays, the hospitality room, auctions and free cocktails at the auction Friday and Saturday afternoons. Your registration also includes coffee breaks throughout the convention, seven meals served in the main ballroom (Breakfast and lunch Thursday, breakfast and lunch Friday, breakfast, lunch and the awards banquet Saturday evening).

RAWHIDE STEAK COOKOUT — This is our one outside function during the convention not included in your convention registration. On Thursday, February 26, we'll leave the Hyatt via bus at 5:00 P.M. sharp . . . with some cold drinks if you like . . . and head out for Rawhide — an authentic 1880 western town with gun fights, wagon train, old west museum, saloons and western shops. A "shootout" is scheduled for 6:00 P.M. and we'll board the wagons at 6:30 P.M. for a private cookout in the desert.

There'll be western entertainment, a huge bonfire, plenty of cocktails for those wanting to indulge, and at 7:30 you'll be treated to the best 22-ounce Western T-bone steak with all the trimmings that you can find in the West. We have some surprises in store, too, and Rawhide promises to be a highlight of the convention. Price is \$25.00 per person for the Rawhide Cookout.

With more than 1,000 persons likely to attend all or part of the upcoming convention, you'll have a chance to renew acquaintances with old friends and make many new ones. Plus you'll be able to find out anything and everything that's happening with wild sheep. You may even go home with the hunt of a lifetime for the fall of 1981... or an outstanding rifle, sheep painting or bronze. There's something for everyone.

#### 1981 WATERHOLE PROJECTS

The following calendar has been selected for the 1981 Waterhole Projects:

#### **JANUARY 10 & 11:**

The first project of the year will be at Dead Deer Tank in the northwest Eagletail Mountains to clean and seal the tank, and construct a wire basket silt diversion dam.

#### **FEBRUARY 21 & 22:**

Bettylou pothole in the Plumosa Mountains is a new development. This project will require helicopter assistance and will be held in conjunction with the annual convention of the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep.

#### MARCH 21 & 22:

The annual St. Patrick's Day project will be in the North Trigo Mountains. We will build a shade for Ten Sheep Tank and a small masonry dam to increase storage capacity at Recluse Tank and at a new development to be called Crotch Tank.

#### APRIL 25 & 26:

The project for April has not been defined pending further investigation of the site.

#### MAY 16 & 17:

The last project for 1981 will be in the Kingman area. The exact location will be announced later.
