



Norris has spent many many hours doing research primarily on bighorn sheep in Aravaipa. His slides and talk on that area were excellent. Much of what was covered were the movement patterns of bighorns in and out of the canyon. His studies have also been directed to determining the effects of competition of bighorns with cattle in this area. Norris was enthusiastic about the future of the Aravaipa Canyon sheep herd. We all share in your enthusiasm, Norris. Oh yeah — I almost forgot — sheep do drink out of Aravaipa Creek.

Several days of rain threatened to dampen efforts of the Society and the Game and Fish Dept. in the Little Horn Mountains. The second waterhole project of the year seemed doomed. Even so, plans had been made, materials acquired, and helicopter time scheduled. Come rain or shine all possible efforts would have to be made.

The weather held for the chopper to air lift materials to the site of the project, funded by the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep. Each of the last three years the Foundation has paid for and participated in a waterhole project such as this. Sievers Tank, named after the well known Phoenix taxidermist Jeff Sievers, who passed away last year, became a reality despite soggy weather and a light Society turnout.

A very large masonry dam was constructed after much effort on the part of everyone participating. A shade was also to be built but time ran out so plans were made to erect the shade at a later date.









Some of the 83 Hunt

Joe had some excellent help on his hunt from people such as Jim Engelmann, Bill Hardy, Tracy Hardy and Eddie Cocking. The ram scores 166.





Someone ought to start taking statistics on people who are successful at drawing sheep permits on their first application. Anyway, this ram was taken on the third day of the hunt out of a herd of twelve rams. The distance was 100 yards and the official Boone and Crockett score is 172-4/8.



Here's another nice one from the north country. The ram was taken by Bruce Sitko of Payson. Bruce is a Spanish and P.E. instructor at Payson High School. The ram was taken in Unit 15B on the second day of the hunt with a Remington 700 BDL in 270 caliber. Along with Bruce on his hunt was hunting companion Dean Pederson, also of Payson. Bruce wishes to thank George Welsh of the Kingman Game and Fish and the ADBSS for information gained at the hunter's clinic. The ram green scored 162-6/8.

A few years back Bill and his son both took desert rams the same year out of Unit 15C.

Another Excellent Convention F.N.A.W.S.

The Foundation for North American Wild Sheep held its annual convention February 9-12 in Reno, Nevada.

Guides and outfitters, western artists and sculptors, gun and knife makers, taxidermists, and sheep enthusiasts from around the world comprised the several thousand people in attendance. The Arizona Desert Bighorn Sheep Society was well represented with several of our members working a booth at the convention. During the five day convention our Society raised over \$3,000.00 by the sale of trinkets, raffle items and membership donations. Several dozen new members were signed up as well as two lifetime members. Our first two lifetime members are Marvin Wood from California and Dennis Hankerson of Phoenix. The highlight of this yearly convention was Saturday when all donated hunts were auctioned to the highest bidders. Wyoming's coveted "Governor's Permit" for a Rocky Mountain Bighorn sold for \$50,000.00 and Utah's annual Desert sheep permit sold for \$32,000.00. The prices paid for these permits is representative of the high value of the sheep permit today. Hopefully, when Arizona is allowed to auction or raffle a sheep permit, tens of thousands of new dollars will be made available for sheep conservation work here in Arizona.

Saturday night at the Awards Banquet our Society was the recipient of the Foundation's annual Conservation Award. Don Johnson accepted this prestigious award on behalf of our Society. The award is for recognition of major contributions toward sheep conservation work.

The Society would like to thank those members who donated their time to represent us in Reno. The Foundation's 1984 convention will be in San Diego, California.

Project: Cipriano Pass Tank

The fourth Society waterhole project for the year was constructed in the Gila Mountains east of Yuma. This is an area rich in history and containing alot of sheep habitat, but sorely in need of permanent water sources.

Early adventurers such as Dr. Edgar Mearns, William Hornady and Charles Sheldon traveled through this part of southern Arizona and northern Mexico in the late 1800's and early 1900's gathering much information about the area's wildlife and, in particular, desert bighorn sheep.

The Society left the highway at Welton, an early jumpoff place for much of the early exploration into the area, and headed into the east side of the impressive Gila Mountains. A natural pothole had been found north of Cipriano Pass on an earlier Game and Fish sheep survey and this was to be the site of the project. Removal of silt from the tank as well as building a dam and shade were to be primary objectives in the effort.


Because of the lack of suitable rocks for a masonry dam, Don Belknap, coordinator of the project for the Arizona Game and Fish Dept., undertook a new approach to building the dam. A plywood form, supported by posts drilled into the solid rock, was built, and, with the help of the Society's cement mixer, a solid-pour dam slowly took shape. Much of the cement which went into the dam was mixed by hand to insure the dam's being finished on Saturday. While all of this was going on, a silt diversion dam was built above the pothole. A large shade was also being built and an auxiliary dam on the lower pothole was constructed to add to the overall water capacity at the site. An awful lot of work was done on Cipriano Pass Tank by a very meager turnout of only 30 people. We could have used 60, but on Sunday the forms were removed revealing a beautiful solid-pour dam. The shade was also finished on Sunday along with finishing touches on the lower pothole completing the project.

One could stand and gaze across this vast desert at the Copper Mountains, the Cabeza Prietas and the Tinajas Atlas Range close by and imagine Charles Sheldon and a few of his companions traveling from mountain range to mountain range in search of desert sheep.

To learn more about this area contact any Society Board member and ask about a most interesting book called "The Wilderness of Desert Bighorns and Seri Indians" which is for sale by the Society.

High Tank #3

The March 5th and 6th project took place in the East Kofa area under the guidance of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

High Tank #3 was originally developed by the C.C.C. back in 1940. The project consisted of the removal of all the silt which had accumulated over the last 40 plus years and sealing the pothole against any future leaks. The existing dam was also raised to increase the tank's capacity to an estimated 50,000 gallons when completely full.

While these efforts were taking place, other Society members were busy constructing a silt dam above the pothole as well as a 30 x 40 foot shade to reduce evaporation and restrict algae growth in the tank. This was a large project for just the 27 folks who showed up for the effort, and a special "thank you" goes out to everyone who made the trip. It was hard work, but the project was 90% finished with just part of the shade needing work to complete the task. The hard-working Kofa Refuge people, directed by Milt Hatterly, will put the finishing touches on the shade.

The cooks outdid themselves this trip by preparing some caribou and moose donated by our illustrious president, Harry Hussey, along with salad, rolls, pocket rockets and a great pot of beans. It is always a good feeling to know that a good meal will be waiting after a hard day at the rock pile.



Bighorn History

During February of this year a bit of history was made as far as desert bighorns go. **Greg Koons** of Phoenix was out doing a little varmit hunting in Unit 40A when he happened upon a carcass of a bighorn. Attached to that carcass was a set of horns that measure just over 202 Boone & Crockett points. That is one of the largest desert bighorns ever recorded and the largest pick-up head to come from Arizona. The base of the old ram measures 15½ inches with lengths of 46½ inches and 45½ inches. The ram appeared to have died several months ago.
