Letter from F.N.A.W.S. Asking for Help From A.D.B.S.S. Members

The Foundation for North American Wild Sheep (FNAWS) has filed a lawsuit in the United States District Court in Cheyenne to prevent geophysical exploration and seismic testing in the Shoshone National Forest. For the past several months we have held meetings after meeting with U.S. Forest Service officials attempting to work out a satisfactory solution that would resolve the environmental damage being done by the seismic testing, but have met with very little success.

After exhausting our administrative remedies, we felt we had no choice but to go to court in an effort to protect the forest and its wildlife. Geophysical exploration companies have detonated explosives on more than 400 miles of test line in the last couple years, and there is no indication of any slow up in the foreseeable future. Maps showing the seismic work that has already been done almost makes the forest look like a spiderweb! To make matters worse, the seismic companies expect to continue their blasting over the same areas year after year.

We feel the seismic testing is having a significant effect on the Bighorn Sheep, elk, grizzly, eagles, falcons, and are also concerned about the other wildlife in the forest. Bighorn sheep are particularly susceptible to the stress of the blasting and low flying helicopters. And, as a result, they have been chased all over the mountains, forced out of their normal habitat and have been behaving erratically. We have heard reports of an extremely low elk calf crop in this area this year, and have heard that the Stinking Springs dieoff of

Bighorn Sheep may be due to the stress of seismic testing. The Shoshone National Forest is one of the last large strongholds of Bighorn Sheep, and the stress of seismic testing could very likely cause "stress pneumonia" and huge dieoffs of this majestic animal. Those of us who have experienced seismic blasting, the helicopters scurrying back and forth and men running up and down the mountains dragging cable, and the "eardrum bursting blasts" are reminded of an old war movie.

We believe the U.S. Forest Service has violated the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) by issuing permits for seismic testing without doing an Environmental Impact Statement. After a similar hard fought battle that lasted for years, we won a major victory over the U.S. Forest Service in California last year when a 3-senior Court Judge panel unanimously ruled in our favor in the 9th U.S. District Court of Appeals, and repeatedly referred to the Forest Service as "being totally unreasonable."

Winning this case is important . . . not only to protect the wildlife in the Shoshone but to set a precedent for seismic testing in all of our nation's National Forests. Plus, it is next to impossible for any of us to go into the forest and enjoy it with such excessive seismic testing going on. Not only are the helicopters and blasting harassing to wildlife and humans alike, but it's downright dangerous if you are on horseback and your horse spooks.

BOOK REVIEW

"TALES FROM TIBURON" — an anthology of adventures in Seriland. Edited by Neil B. Carmony and David E. Brown (The Southwest Natural History Association, Phoenix, Arizona, 146 P, illustrated. Paperback \$9.95; Hardback \$15.95)

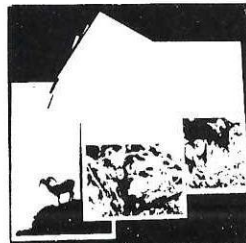
Tiburon Island (Shark Island) in the Gulf of California has long been shrouded in mystery. The island has remained a place apart because of the presence there and on the adjacent mainland of Sonora, Mexico, of the "wild" Seri Indians. For two centuries strange stories circulated throughout the Southwest about the warlike Seris and explorers who set out for Tiburon and were never heard from again. The Seris were secretive, suspicious of strangers, sometimes dangerous; a rugged people tenaciously eking out a subsistence living in a land where others would perish.

Today, much of the magic and mystery has faded from Tiburon and the Seri country. The Indians no longer live on Tiburon; they now stay close to the tourist roads on the mainland and sell wood carvings (a recently adopted craft) to vacationing Americans. The process of acculturation attempted by the soldiers and missionaries is being accomplished by the peso and the dollar.

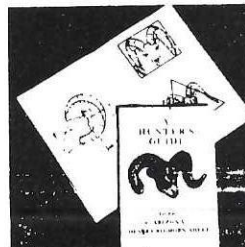
This volume includes first-hand accounts by five reporters - one Englishman and four Americans - who dared to enter the domain of the Seris during the

period 1826 to 1922, long before the age of the motor home and air-conditioned motel. Two of these expeditions were lured to Tiburon by rumors of Seri gold; one was sent out to gather anthropological information. Another explorer entered the wilderness in search of his brother who had disappeared on a prospecting expedition; the last account was written by a hunter-naturalist engaged in collecting zoological specimens. The desert took its toll on the explorers; three expeditions failed in their objectives, and one ended in disaster. Only the expedition by the indefatigable hunter, Charles Sheldon, was truly a success.

Consider this collection of exploration adventures as a farewell tribute to the now vanished wilderness of

Tiburon and the Seris - a wilderness that was forbidding, even terrible, but always fascinating.

Commission Approves Two Sheep Permits for Raffle - Auction

At their October 21st meeting, the Arizona Game & Fish Commission approved the Society's application for two sheep permits for use in fundraising efforts. Approval for our request was evidenced by a 4-0 vote by the Commission after a presentation by the Game & Fish Department staff.

Those members who worked to help this happen can be very proud of the effort they contributed to see this project through. There were committee meetings, commission meetings, letters, phone calls, and personal contacts by many members of the Sheep Society. We had to sell the Department on the idea, then the Commission, then the Legislature, the public, fellow sportsmen, and even some of our own members.

This has been a controversial idea from the very beginning for some - the raffling or auctioning of hunting permits. But what an opportunity we have now, to raise a very significant amount of money to be spent here in Arizona on Desert Bighorn Sheep. The work that can be done in transplanting sheep and developing permanent water in sheep ranges because of this fundraising project will have a lasting impact on Arizona's Desert Sheep herd.

The Commission has granted two permits to the Society for the 1984 hunt. This hunt will occur during December of 1984, with dates to be confirmed by the Department when they set other big-game season dates.

ANY PERSON is eligible to obtain these permits. There is no residency restriction, and the "once-in-a-lifetime" restriction does not apply to these permits. Additionally, the cost of the license and tag is waived by the Department for these permits.

ALL PROCEEDS GENERATED by marketing these permits will be utilized for sheep work here in Arizona. Costs associated with conducting the raffle and auction will be absorbed by the Sheep Society.

One of the permits has been designated for use in the KOFA Mountains. This area is known throughout the world as perhaps the finest desert sheep range in

the United States. A Kofa sheep tag is highly prized by all knowledgeable sheep hunters, having provided many record book rams.

The Society has made arrangements with the Foundation for North American Wild Sheep to offer this permit in a public auction at the Foundation's Convention in San Diego, February 22-26, 1984. All Proceeds from this auction will come directly to Arizona for use in our transplant program.

The second permit has been designated for the Aravaipa Canyon area in Unit 31. This is the area that produced John Harris' 189 point ram in 1982 and several other record book sheep since it was opened to hunting. The Aravaipa Canyon herd was Arizona's first sheep transplant and its notoriety was enhanced by the legendary "Old Grandad" who was released in Aravaipa as a young ram captured in the Kofas. The genetic superiority of this one magnificent ram is apparent today in the rams in Aravaipa.

This permit will be issued to the person holding the winning ticket in a raffle to be conducted by the Society. Donation for each ticket is \$25.00, with no limit to the number of donations/tickets per person. A public drawing will be held in Phoenix during July or August of 1984 to select the winner. Tickets are now being printed and will be available shortly. If you wish to make your donation(s) prior to the end of the year, send your check or money order (U.S. funds) made payable to ADBSS SHEEP RAFFLE to P.O. Box 5241, Phoenix, AZ 85010. Ticket stubs will be sent to you by return mail.

The Department's transplant program has been very successful in recent years. The past 2-3 "wet" years have contributed to an abundance of transplantable sheep in several areas. Many historic sheep ranges have been identified and surveyed. The only limiting factor to continuing and accelerating this transplant effort is funding. We have an opportunity to provide this missing ingredient - right now. Let's get behind this raffle and make it a success. **MAYBE YOU'LL BE THE LUCKY ONE!**

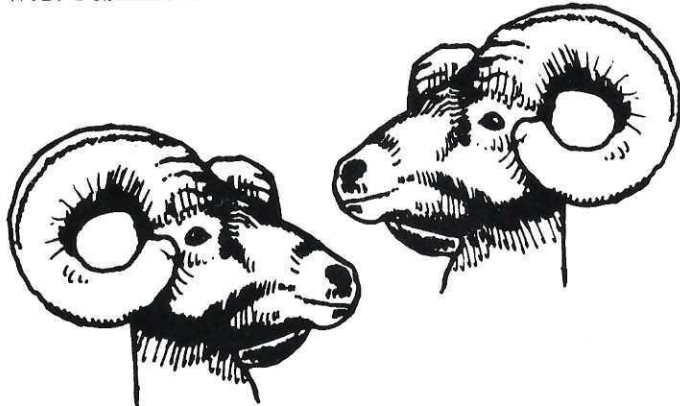
